Back to School ... with Help from the Library!

The library has so many ways to help students and parents throughout the school year! We offer online homework and research assistance 24/7 through our databases (for example: *Mango Languages*, which teaches conversational skills for 12 languages, including English as a Second Language; *CultureGrams*, a social studies database providing information on daily life, culture, and history of the world's peoples; *World Book Online*, which offers the encyclopedia's vast store of knowledge, plus supplementary videos and images and hyperlinks between entries).

In addition to our regular databases, students can click on the *Live Homework Help* link at the bottom of our home page, select a grade level (K-12, College Intro, or Adult Learner), choose a subject they need help with, and enter Tutor.com's Online Classroom where a certified subject-expert will tutor them in real time—via chat, a virtual drawing board, and website and file sharing—to work through whatever challenge they're facing in school.

Finally, there are all the traditional ways in which the library can help students master their subject matter, everything from books and non-fiction DVDs to the living, breathing human beings—experts on getting the most out of our collection—that staff our Information Desk. We're here to help you!

The Director's Corner

Well, incredibly, fall is upon us. This is the time of year that the library usually gets ready for a lot of things that the summer has pushed aside. But this year we're really gearing up for a major change. By mid-winter everyone will be asking, "Where is the library?" Good question. We are currently looking for space in the town of Easton that will accommodate us for eighteen months while the main building is expanded and renovated.

At this time the architect is hard at work on his drawings for the building. The design phase has been completed. It looks as though all of the necessary drawings will be finished by mid-winter. The library staff has already begun "cleaning house." We have to move and, as anyone who has moved knows, you do not want to carry things with you that you will only have to dispose of after the move! In preparation for the move, the book sale will end in November (we will accept donations through October)

and the meeting room will close in December. We are hoping to make the big move in either December or January. At that time all of the furniture, shelving, and books will be set up in our new (temporary) location.

While in our temporary quarters, the library will streamline its operations so we can continue to provide essential services—circulation, public access computers, and some children's programming. We will not have a meeting room. Some of our programming will have to be held off site. The library's St. Michaels branch will continue to offer its full range of services.

I am looking forward to this move as an adventure. If you look at it in any other way it is too daunting. This project is a long time in coming and I feel very strongly that our community will benefit from this new facility.

Check in with us regularly at the library or on our website to see how the adventure is progressing.



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One Maryland One Book

James McBride's novel Song Yet Sung has been selected for this year's One Maryland One Book, the program in which people all across the state read and discuss the same book. Set on Maryland's Eastern Shore in the 1850s, Song Yet Sung tells a gripping story of escaped slaves, free blacks, and slave-catchers. The protagonist is an enslaved



woman who develops a gift for prophetic vision following her escape from a local plantation.

James McBride is an award-winning novelist, composer, and screenwriter. Author of the *New York Times* best-selling memoir *The Color of Water*, McBride's first novel, *Miracle at St. Anna*, was made into a 2008 film directed by Spike Lee (available on DVD at the library).

Author Discusses Harriet Tubman Novel

On Thursday, September 10, at 7:00 p.m., in the Easton branch of the Talbot County Free Library, author Beverly Lowry will discuss her book *Harriet Tubman: Imagining a Life.* Lowry is the author of six novels and the nonfiction works *Crossed Over* and *Her Dream of Dreams.* The recipient of the 2007 Richard Wright Literary Excellence Award, Lowry teaches at George Mason University. Her latest novel has been described as "an astonishing re-imagining of the remarkable life of Harriet Tubman, the 'Moses of Her People.'"

On Monday, September 21, at 6:00 p.m., Gwendolyn Briley-Strand will present a PowerPoint program entitled, *Harriet Tubman: Meet the Woman.* In 1991 and again in 1992, Briley-Strand performed as Harriet Tubman at the White House for the Fourth of July Celebration. She also has portrayed Harriet Tubman at the Smithsonian, the Kennedy Center, and other museums and cultural organizations. This program is made possible by the Maryland Humanities Council.

This 8-volume print edition of *The African American National Biography*—a joint project of the W. E. B. Du Bois Institute for African and African American Research at Harvard University and Oxford University Press—contains more than 4,000 biographies.
